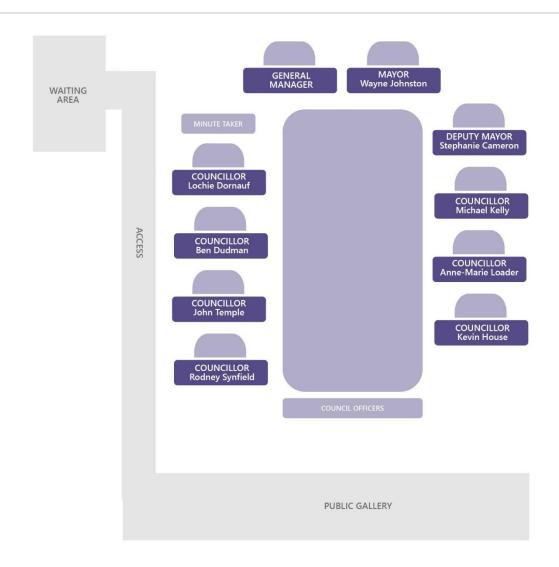

This Month's Public Questions With Notice

Question 1: Tanya King, Westbury (received via email)

Could Council please advise when Jones Street South, and South Street will be sealed, commensurate with the development, and increased traffic movements as a direct result of the subdivision of the property?

Dino De Paoli, Director Infrastructure Services advised Council's forward works program does not include capital works for the bitumen sealing of Jones Street South or South Street. Council last considered the sealing of gravel roads in Westbury in 2018, however, did not support any funding at that point in time.

Question 2: Craig Zimitat, Deloraine (received via website)

In February 2023, the Integrity Commission Tasmania released a report on systemic misconduct risks in recruiting local government employees in Tasmania, as identified in an investigation into alleged misconduct in eight recruitments at one Tasmanian council. The recruitments investigated by the Commission showed a lack of proper recruitment policy and procedure. The report focused on four systemic issues identified in the investigation: (i) the lack of requirement to apply the merit principle, (ii) an absence of model policies and procedures, including relating to direct appointments, (iii) inadequate record keeping practices, and (iv) poor understanding, identification and management of conflicts of interest.

Since that report, what steps have the General Manager and Councillors of Meander Valley Council taken to ensure the community has confidence in the integrity of its recruitment and appointment processes?

Mayor Wayne Johnston advised that Council is aware of the Integrity Commission report. The report recommends that the Minister for Local Government and Planning develop a model recruitment policy for Tasmanian councils and we will consider this model policy when received. Councillors fully considered all options when appointing the new General Manager. Advice was provided to Councillors on behalf of the Director of Local Government. Council is required to make appointments of the general manager in accordance with sections 61 and 61A of the *Local Government Act 1993*, as amended by the Tasmanian Government from time to time. The General Manager of Council makes appointments in accordance with section 63 of the *Local Government Act 1993*, as amended by the Tasmanian Government from time to time. Council has an internal Recruitment Policy and Recruitment Process to guide employee appointments by the General Manager. No changes to the Recruitment Policy and Recruitment Process have been made since February 2023.

Question 3: Annette Camino, Hagley (received via email and website)

Any updates on the installation of the Westbury Dump Point?

Dino De Paoli, Director Infrastructure Services there are no updates since the correspondence provided to Mrs Camino dated 11 July 2023 which was "We are currently undertaking a process to prioritise completion of projects carried forward from last financial year as well as the new projects adopted by Council, however, I have requested my team to progress with work on the dump point as soon as possible. Note as per previous advice from Council, we will also make contact with the CMCA once we are ready to commence." Council officers are working through a period of high workload at the present time.

Recommendation to Council

That Council approves, pursuant to Section 11 of the *Place Names Act 2020*, the proposed 13 new road names for the Country Club Estate subdivision as listed in Table 1 below.

Report

Thirteen new roads will be constructed as part of the Country Club Estate subdivision in Prospect Vale.

The proposed new road names as listed in Table 1 below have been requested by the developer and the property owner. Table 1 also provides background as to the reason for the road names requested.

The proposed names have been presented to Placenames Tasmania for an initial review to ensure the names meet the guidelines in respect to duplication or similarity with existing names in the northern region of Tasmania, as well as acceptable use of generic terms to describe the road, i.e. street, lane, etc. The names in Table 1 are the result of the review process and have been deemed acceptable by Placenames Tasmania.




Figure 1: Country Club Estate Subdivision - Road Naming Proposal - Site Plan

Figure 1 is a location map provided by the developer showing the layout of the estate and proposed roads.

Review of 2023-24 Capital Works Program Budgets

That Council approves:

- 1. The receipt of grant funding contributions from Phase 4 of the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (LRCI) of \$1,378,667 for allocation to current and proposed capital works projects;
- 2. In line with Section 82(4) of the *Local Government Act 1993*, budget variation to capital grant revenue for 2023-24 of \$551,467 reflecting 40% of the LRCI grants due upon signing; and
- 3. In line with Section 82(4) of the *Local Government Act 1993*, budget variations to the Capital Works Program for 2023-24, in Attachment 1 titled "Proposed Capital Works Project Adjustments", noting an overall increase in the value of the program by \$1,411,500.

Report

The purpose of this report is to seek Council approval for variation of the 2023-24 Capital Works Program through the receipt of additional government grant funding for existing projects and addition of new Council and government funded projects.

Section 82(4) of the *Local Government Act 1993* requires the Council to approve by absolute majority any proposed alteration to Council's estimated capital works outside the limit of the General Manager's financial delegation of \$20,000.

Project budget allocations within the Capital Works Program that are submitted to the Council for approval prior to the commencement of each fiscal year are prepared using a range of methods. In some instances and depending on the availability of resources and time constraints, projects can be thoroughly scoped, and accurate estimates prepared using available empirical or supplier information. Conversely, project cost estimates may only be general allowances prepared using the best information available at the time.

During the fiscal year, detailed design, adjustment to project scope and the undertaking of additional works during construction, results in project expenditure under and over approved budget amounts. New projects may also be requested for inclusion in the Program, or removal.

The overall financial objective in delivering the Capital Works Program is to have a zero net variation in the program budget. Project savings are generally used to offset project overruns and additional funding can be requested to assist with balancing the budget or to finance new projects.

In this instance, Officers made application to the Australian Government to secure funding through Phase 4 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program, and now request Council approval for this funding to be incorporated into the 2023-24 Capital Works Program. Through the addition of this grant funding to three existing and two new projects, and inclusion of two new projects funded by Council through transfers from cash reserves, the overall change in the Program budget is \$1,411,500.

Refer to the attached "Proposed Capital Works Project Adjustments" table for the funding allocation details and new project information.

It is noted that while the overall capital works budget and list of projects is significant, Officers considered which balance of projects to receive additional grant funding would have the least impact on current workloads. Bridge reconstruction projects will be issued to the market for pricing as design and construct projects and typically require less Council overheads. Additionally, it is noted that a condition of the LRCI funding does not require projects to be completed until end of June 2025.

Information for the new projects listed for the Quamby Brook bridge reconstruction and the Rickman Street subdivision contribution has been provided to Council for consideration at the August 2023 Workshop.
